Motivations to Learn About Food Safety



Food Safety Influence on Decision Making

- Food safety and produce safety constantly influence their decision making.
- Impact on the quality of product.
- Depends on the activity being performed.
- Market access.
- Pass an audit or be in compliance with a regulation.

✓ Want Transparent and Plain Language Information.

✓ Largest perceived barrier is expense.

Confident in Knowledge Despite Lack of Formal Training

Plan to Implement Food Safety Practices as a Result of Training



85% of respondents or more responded with somewhat or strongly agree that they could:



Describe how human pathogens spread in their operation



Identify the ways to reduce food safety risks in their operation





Want hands-on or on-farm learning

Listening Session Main Takeaways

✓ Local food producers reach all food distribution channels.

✓ There are food safety practices that need adoption or improvement.



✓ Requirements are complex and need to be clearly shared.

 \checkmark Local producers want and need additional resources.





✓ Technical assistance is wanted and needed from individuals who are competent, accessible, and trusted.

- Support and education is important because these farmers impact all markets.
- FSMA regulations may impact products available locally.
 - Lost economic opportunities.







Food Safety Practices for Adoption/Improvement



WORKER TRAINING

40.2% of producers reported worker training as not applicable to their operation during the survey.

Even though water implementation dates are delayed it has not delayed the pressure growers feel from buyers or themselves to do something.

WATER TESTING





Recordkeeping only creates an illusion of food safety..."it's triaging everyday; like what's a real problem and what's the fake problems. 90 percent of FSMA is fake."





Requirements are Complex and Need to Be Clearly Shared



Many participants have signed up for information and put effort into trying to learn but the information is still difficult to understand or not tailored to their needs.



Growers requested that rule requirements be stated in simpler terms and presented in factsheets or checklists.



Current examples provided in resources are not size-specific for local producers and do not meet their scale of operations.



Food producers want to comply with regulations but it's unclear how to find what regulations apply to them and then how to comply to the ones that do apply.

Technical Assistance From Individuals

RELATIONSHIPS ARE KEY!

Inexperienced or incompetent trainers can have a negative impact on the attitude and motivation to implement practices.



Having a trusted individual who was knowledgeable and accessible helped farmers receive tailored information.



Individuals mentioned were from University Extension, state government, and NGO.
